

Creek Fire Autumn

In mid-October of this year, Jim Sanderson and myself ventured over to the Eastern Sierras to shoot the Fall Color. Timing was perfect with the exception that the whole frickin' State was afire and the smoke from the Creek Fire was being pushed into the Mono Lake Basin, specifically, and everything East of the crest, generally.

We arrived late in the morning, descended into Lee Vining Canyon and went into the Aspens along Lee

Vining Creek to get some shots.



Jim actually recognized this composition before I set eyes on it. When I understood what he was shooting, I concurred that it was worth capturing. (I did take a little different angle on it and used my customary "bracketed" technique.) I was attracted by the isolation and visual relationship of/between the two trees and the boulder; and, of course, the colors and textures in both foreground and background. The inclusion of the partial grass plant in the near foreground was intentional. I like to get some element to create a distinct foreground in all my images.

As always, the shot was made on a tripod. The camera was my trusty Nikon D850 with a Nikkor 24-70mm, f/2.8 mounted. Focal length was 24mm, aperture f/22 and focal distance set at 3" to achieve a hyper-focal effect. Shutter speed varied though a 9 frame bracketed sequence. ISO was 64, focusing method set to manual and metering was set to pattern (matrix). Post processing began with merging the 9 frames into an HDR rendering using Nik software. Once rendered, the image was processed in Photoshop with lots of use of Nik software. You can see the smoke in the air, but it was much worse prior to using the Camera Raw filter and pushing the "Dehaze" slider hard to the right. Some power lines were cloned out and luminosity masks were used to edit tone and depth, among other techniques used as well as a liberal dose of sheer dumb luck.

Hazy Golden Hour Yosemite 3

This was actually a cell phone shot with my Samsung S9+ (f 2.4, 1/160 sec, ISO 50, 4.3 mm) taken in late October of this year. I saw the amazing golden hour light and knew I had to get a quick shot before I set up my DSLR camera. It was still hazy due to the smoke in the air from the wildfires, which added to the golden hour effect.

I thought I'd just do a few quick touch ups on the cell phone shot before I dug into the "real" shots. However, that's like going down the editing rabbit hole. I started with Snapseed, but then realized I could import it into Lightroom and do a few more things. I learned how to use vertical guides to straighten it. I also used Photoshop with levels, some dodging and burning, and Nik Color Efex Pro 2 (Detail extractor and Sunlight). I also had to find the right balance of haze and detail on the granite in the distance. I debated whether to crop more from the top, but then the horizon would have been right in the center, so I left it alone.
