Digital Chairs Report – February 2017

For the first digital competition of 2017 I received images from 20 members for a total of 60 images to be judged by Shirley Ward, FPSA, EPSA of Madera Camera Club. A few members had problems with correct file name formats and correct image sizing, but all were corrected and right with little fuss.



With this winter's tremendous snow fall for Yosemite, winter scenes accounted for a good number of images. I had looked into our options and found a new competition software to utilize for the showing and scoring of the images. This new software will allow us to show the images in alphabetical order by makers name, or it can completely randomize all images so they come up in any order, for this meeting alphabetical was used.

Shirley gave good critique and evaluated the images, awarding a total of 10 scores of 10, with three different makers snagging two tens apiece. She then narrowed down the images to the top 4, awarding Picture of the Month to *Amazing Architecture*, by **Dee Humphrey**. Second place went to **Jonathan Rollins** with *Grandmother and Granddaughter*, third to **John Greening** and *Mushrooms in a Row* and finally 4th place went to **Dr Ning Lin** and *Yosemite Valley View*. Thanks go to **Anna Hadfield** for stepping in and reading out titles, makers and recording the scores as a back up to the electronic scoring.



Some of these small mushrooms were peeking out from under the side of a small log. After rolling it onto its side I realized that there was a nice row of them. All of the recent rain has made many pieces of downed tree limbs great growth areas for fungi. To make it easier to get perpendicular the mushrooms I picked it up and set it onto a horizontal limb that was about shoulder height. Then with a 100mm macro lens on my Canon 60D I was more easily able to a depth of field that included all of them. Cropping and other post-processing adjustments were done in Lightroom with a few bright spots cloned out in Photoshop.



Artist Palette

When mentioning Death Valley to someone who has never been there, the response is usually, “Who in their right mind would want to go to a place with such unbearable heat and desert desolation?” It is understandable, with what one is exposed to in the media, but apart from the 120 degree heat in the summer months, the rest of the year is quite comfortable. In my experience, November through March is the most desirable time to visit this truly remarkable area of photographic opportunities. Death Valley is located in Southeastern California between the town of Lone Pine to the west and Las Vegas, Nevada to the east. The town of Mojave is about 200 miles to the south. Highway 395, paralleling the eastern Sierra Nevada Mountains, is the most accessible route to roads that lead into Death Valley. Highway 395, with Mojave to the south and Lake Tahoe to the north is one of the most scenic drives in the western United States, and will beckon you and your camera gear.

Sand dunes are a passion of mine, whether they be rippled with texture or as smooth as a baby’s bottom. They are both mesmerizing and hypnotic. They compare to the soft and undulating forms of a nude, as they rise and swirl and are creatively sculpted by the desert winds. I always stand in the belly of these dunes prior to photographing them and just take in the

jaw-dropping wonder of the beauty and silence surrounding me.

There are no less than five areas to photograph dunes in Death Valley. Mesquite Dunes are the most photographed and the most accessible dunes in the area. One can park in the parking lot and walk twenty feet and feel the sand underfoot. This area, just two miles east of the Stovepipe Wells Resort, has restroom facilities, parking, and lots of people. People with their energized children love to run with reckless abandon all over these pristine sculptures. Driving east of this area about two or three miles, parking your vehicle just off of the road, and walking into the dunes about one mile, will reward you with the dunes of paradise awaiting your capture.

Eureka Dunes is more isolated and can be accessed by dirt road just north of Scotty’s Castle or from Highway 168 East of the town of Big Pine (You must travel on a fairly tolerable dirt or gravel road no matter which route you take). These dunes are very large in every dimension and are very photographable. Accommodations include restroom facilities (outhouses) as well as camping options.

Panamint Valley Dunes are located in Panamint Valley, about ten miles west of Death Valley. A dirt road of questionable character must be navigated to approach these dunes and a pretty good walk

will be required to access them. Dumont Dunes is south of Death Valley and is very accessible from Highway 127 between the towns of Baker and Shoshone and is visible from the highway. The biggest problem for photographers is that the dunes are open for off-road vehicles and if they are present, the only shots that you will get will be photojournalism. Just northwest of Dumont Dunes is Ibex Dunes. Ibex Dunes is located about 10 miles north of Highway 127 via dirt or gravel road. These dunes are a little smaller than the others but are very photographable. **Fred Hankins, APSA**, became famous for photographing Ibex Dunes in the 1940's and 1950's.

The best time of the day for capturing some of the most amazing images that you will ever encounter is, of course, sunrise. Sunset will also give you good results. My choice for photographing the dunes is a wide-angle lens and a polarizing filter or perhaps a graduated neutral-density filter. I typically use a Canon 10 to 22mm super-wide angle zoom lens at f-16 or f-22 aperture setting. A tripod is a must and can be easily adjusted because the legs are usually buried in the sand. They can be pushed further into the sand or the tripod can be pulled out further. An interesting phenomenon occurs when facing north, south, east or west; the sand changes color. When facing south the sand may be nearly white; when facing north it may cast a more orange tone. Observing these differences might influence the personality of the image that you wish to take. Setting the tripod low and including the ripples

of the dunes into the foreground, while using the wide-angle lens, will give a terrific feeling of depth in your image. Another interesting image can be achieved by using a long lens of perhaps 200mm and shooting an image that would include the dunes and the mountains beyond. This effect of compressing distant mountains and foreground dunes can be quite stunning.

Death Valley's other attractions include many canyons, vistas, and a view from Dante's Point high above the valley that is truly breathtaking. Sunsets are almost always good because of the clouds that seem to hover over the eastern Sierra Nevada mountains. Twenty Mule Team Canyon is one of my favorite spots because of the many textured hills and mountains, and the winding road that serpentine its way through the canyon. The unusual mineral deposits in the canyons, especially Artist's Palette, give color to the walls and mountain sides that one would not expect. When your images are downloaded into your favorite post-processing venue, the colors will mature into the painted desert that Death Valley truly is.

There are a few ghost towns in the area that serve up a concoction of rusty trucks, cars and mining implements, as well as decaying old buildings and outhouses from days gone by. There are plenty of opportunities to do macro photography with the abundance of old rusty machinery and tools that permeate the area.

You may have seen images of rocks or boulders that appear to have been sliding on the surface of the wet, winter desert mud. This area is a dry

lakebed that lies in the north west area of Death Valley and is named, "Race Track." If you are very adventurous and determined to photograph this unusual phenomenon, be prepared for a very bumpy and wash-board riddled dirt and gravel road. A four-wheel drive vehicle is recommended, as a typical passenger car could be shaken into a million pieces by the actions of the road. Hang onto your hat for about an hour and a half in, and an hour and a half out.

Wildlife is sparse, but if you are an accomplished nature photographer I'm sure that you will have no problem finding the occasional coyote, rattlesnake, roadrunner or even wild burros.

For overnight accommodations check the websites for Stovepipe Wells, Furnace Creek Ranch, and for the more sophisticated, Furnace Creek Inn. These are the only hotel/resorts in Death Valley. Camping is also available at Stovepipe Wells and Furnace Creek Ranch.

Bring all of your photography tools as there is something to photograph around every corner. If you let your imagination be your guide, exploring this truly beautiful desert will be extremely fulfilling. Give yourself plenty of time in Death Valley; the experiences and photographic opportunities are often, rewarding and never ending.

Organizing Images

I'm not sure how others store their images, but for a number of years I have stored mine in folders by date, they are stored hierarchically in subfolders for year, month and day.

Recently I was trying to help my wife, Anna, sort out her images. They were stored by date the last year or two, but everything else was in folders named where she was, the camera she used, some cute name, anything really, with no logical order or way to find more recent work.

She also had phone images, Facebook images and backed up phone images mixed in. The result was 41 GB of images, with many duplicates of a lot of them (up to 6 copies of a single image).

I set about organizing them... the first couple of hours was me sorting through and culling the obvious duplicates, slow and very ineffective when the sheer number of images was considered. I started searching around the internet and came up with a couple of free programs that really sorted out the process.

The first was dupeGuru, a small utility that just pulls out duplicates based on file name, or img details. IT is free, but the current version no longer supports PC. They still make an older version available for windows and it worked just fine.

Now it was time to cull the Facebook images, I used windows search and pulled every image with either .FB. or Facebook in the file names, these were the Facebook version of images that we already had, lower resolution and compressed. I also noted that her original cell phone pictures had numerical file names, while the back ups had either "Cell phone" or "CAM" in the file names, these were eliminated in the same manner.

Now I was down to a more manageable 12408 files, but they were still clustered everywhere, no logical file order or folder structure.

This lead to more searching and I came across DIM 5 - Digital Image Mover. It was an automated program that would take a folder, search the images for exif data and then rebuild a catalog in date or, structured by year, month and day. It could actually rename the files, and the structure was user configurable. Perfect, now my OCD obsessed brain could deal with the pictures, in a nice logical order!

Now obviously before attempting anything like this, be sure to have a backup of the entire catalog of images, just in case anything goes wrong.


