This image was taken from Tunnel View Yosemite on June 10, 2023. We were hiking in Yosemite National Park. In the early afternoon thunderstorm brought heavy rain and hail. When we returned home and stopped by at Tunnel View in afternoon. We were so lucky to see rainbow appeared over half dome. I quickly took some photos by hand-holding camera. The rainbow lasted only about 5 minutes. Canon EOS R7 with Canon 18-150 mm lens at 35 mm, f/8, 1/30 sec, IOS 640, hand-held; processed with Lightroom, denoised with Topaz deNoise AI and detailed with Nik Viveza.






Yosemite at Night

I used app Planit to plan the location and timing for Milky way. I also use Low Level Landscape Lighting (LLLL) technique to lit up the front objects. Nikon D850 with 20 mm Lens, f/1.8, 20 sec, IOS 8000 on tripod; processed with Lightroom, denoised with Topaz deNoise AI and detailed with Nik Viveza.





Afternoon Aspen Abstract

This image was captured 10/12/2021 at 09:48 at one of the many lakes visited by Jim Sanderson, Jonathan Rollins and myself on the Central Eastern side of the Sierras, near Lee Vining.

This stand of Aspen bordered the shoreline and was backlit by the mid-morning Sun. The colors, radiance and patterns presented attracted me and I exposed for several bracketed HDR shots. I envisioned the potential of an "abstract composition" at the time of capture. (As I compose this document, I realize that I mis-titled it. Using our culture's current favorite excuse for anything, I identified it as afternoon.)

As per my usual previous routine, I was shooting with my trusty and much beloved Nikon D850 affixed with a Nikkor 24-70 f/2.8, on tripod. Settings as follow: shooting Mode – manual; metering – Matrix (Pattern); ISO – 800; focal length – 45mm. The image is a bracketed 9 shot HDR composite so the shutter

speed varied.

Post processing began with the melding of 9 varied exposure shots, 1 f/ stop apart, using NIK HDR Efex Pro 2. Basic RAW processing was done in Adobe Camera Raw with artistic emphasis completed in Photoshop and NIK software. A texture layer is used to further modify its appearance to artistic taste (mine).

Unlike the adults, they are very happy-go-lucky and provided much amusement. This little one was irresistible so I took many photos of him and chose this one to submit in the July competition.

I used a Canon 5d Mark III, 500 mm Canon lens, f4.5, 1/500th second shutter speed with an ISO of 1600.

Call to Artists

The Lodi Community Art Center and Gallery (LCAC) presents its Annual Juried Photography Show and Sale. All interested photographers are invited to submit entries. Work must be original to the artist. Works accepted into a prior LCAC Photography Show are not eligible. LCAC reserves the right to reject any work that has unacceptable subject matter.

Entry

You may enter up to six (6) images of original works of photographic art via our on-line "SmarterEntry" System. Works may be classic dark room photography, digitally enhanced and/or digitally created by camera, drone, or phone. Entered works must have been created in the last 24 months. Access to the on-line entry system (SmarterEntry) is via https://client.smarterentry.com/LodiArtCenter/. Entries require jpeg files and entry will not be complete until payment of entry fees are made.

Categories

- Abstract These images will be created using photography materials and equipment that don't have an
 immediate association with the physical world. The use of perspective, movement and light is used to
 transform the world into unexpected or unrecognizable images.
- Landscapes These images depict an expanse of scenery. The subject is the scenery and not individual
 elements of the scene. These images include but are not limited to landscapes, seascapes, cityscapes,
 outdoor scenic, sunsets, farms, etc.
- Creative Collage These images include composites and photomontages of more than one photograph to
 create a new composition or interpretation of reality as real or imaginary scenes.
- Nature These images depict a range of photographs devoted to displaying natural elements such as
 plants, flowers, trees, animals in any setting wild, domestic, farm, zoo, birds, sea life, insects, and
 close-ups of natural scenes and textures.
- People These images include people, culture, lifestyle, street, and sports photography and may depict
 moments of everyday life when the ordinary becomes extraordinary and seeks to capture chance
 interactions of everyday activity.
- Still Life/Food/Found Object These images depict inanimate subject matter. They are typically
 commonplace objects which may be either natural (food, flowers, plants, rocks, shells, etc.) or man-made
 (drinking glasses, books, vases, jewelry, coins, and so on). Still life, an arrangement of objects by the
 photographer, but this category also includes the more spontaneous discovery of everyday objects in
 their given environment.

As the artist, you can put your entries in any category. However, LCAC and the Show Judge (s) reserve the right to change the category of any entry.

Fees

LCAC Members: \$20 per entry, Non-Members: \$25 per entry. Non-members are encouraged to join Lodi Community Art Center and enjoy the benefits of membership. All fees are non-refundable. Payment is made via the on-line SmarterEntry system.

Show Awards - Money (\$2,000), Ribbons and Merchandise

- Best of Show \$300
- 1st (\$100), 2nd (\$75), 3rd (\$50) and Honorable Mention for each category
- People's Choice (\$50)

Awards are given at the Judge's discretion. The Judge's decisions are final. Awards will be presented at the Photography Show Reception. People's Choice Award is determined at the end of the show from tallying the votes of Show attendees.

Sales

Works **must** be for sale. The LCAC will retains a 30% commission for members and a 35% commission for nonmembers on any sales during the show. Accepted artists are encouraged to submit matted prints and/or cards of accepted works for sale in the LCAC Gallery during the show. Artist should account for the commission when pricing works. Payment for works sold will be sent in November.

Show Specifications

All works delivered must be framed and wired ready to hang on hooks. Gallery wraps, acrylic and metal prints are acceptable. Wired ends must be taped. Longest dimension of each entry must not exceed 36 inches. All works will be on display for the duration of the show. All works must include the artists name, address, phone number, email address, title and price on the back. Artwork that differs from the accepted image entered will be rejected.

Delivery of Accepted Works

Works accepted into the show must be hand delivered to the LCAC Gallery on September 23 or 24, 2022 between 11 AM and 4:00 PM, or may be shipped to:

Shipped items must have a pre-paid return shipping label and arrive no later than September 24, 2022 A check for \$20 for handling fees must accompany shipped items.

Pickup

All works must be picked up October 28 or 29 during regular gallery hours (11 AM to 4:00 PM). Works not picked up by November 5 will be charges \$5 per piece/day and those not picked up by November 15 will become gallery property.

Liability

The Lodi Community Art Center and Gallery will be diligent in the care and handling of your artwork, but it is not responsible for any loss or damage that might occur. Insurance is the artist's responsibility.

Scapes—Cappadocia Balloon Ride by Colette Brunelle of Glen Cove High School in Glen Cove, New York, and sponsored by the Photographic Federation of Long Island.

Photojournalism—*Exhilarating Basketball* by Joshua Guirguis of Cherokee High School in Marlton, New Jersey, and sponsored by the Ocean County Camera Club.

Color Choice—Escape from Reality by Kaylee Suwalski of Farmingdale High School in Farmingdale, New York, and sponsored by the Photographic Federation of Long Island.

Monochrome Choice—3 A.M. Nights in S.F. by Dylan Morales of Mead High School in Longmont, Colorado, and sponsored by the Loveland Photographic Society.

Jeanine Du Rand's image, *Longing*, was chosen Best of Show in the projected image section and will receive a Best of Show plaque, special ribbon, student membership in PSA and a \$350.00 award. The other five students with first place images will receive a \$175.00 award.





My artwork, "Escape from Reality" aims to create an abstract world out of an ordinary





The Youth Showcase is represented on the PSA Board of Directors by Signe Emmerich, HonPSA, EPSA, who serves as the Vice President of Chapters, Clubs, and Councils and looks over the various functioning parts of the Youth Showcase. There she is available to help the rest of the Showcase Committee members. The two committee members who receive the images and prepare them for judging are Ramona Lenger, the projected image coordinator, and Kathleen Z. Braun, HonPSA, PPSA, the print coordinator. They also have the responsibility of getting the results to where they are needed. Gerald H. Emmerich, Jr., HonFPSA, GMPSA/G makes all the arrangements for the judging of the projected images by finding willing judges around the country. This year he also found the place and judges for the print section. Two invaluable committee members who carry out the vital tasks of preparing the showcase for the Society are Brian Lauttamus and Gerard Hying. Brian not only scans all the prints for the brochure and the magazine article, but also produces the Youth Showcase presentation which will be shown in Williamsburg, Virginia, this year. He also makes it available on the website to teachers and classes after the presentation. The painstaking work of setting up the showcase display boards for the print room in Williamsburg is done by Gerard Hying. He receives the copies of the projected images and the scanned prints, then spends several hours making sure each image is placed on the correct category board and has the proper labels (title, student, school) for each. And still serving as the Committee Chair and Showcase Director is Kathleen Z. Braun, HonPSA, PPSA.

Special thanks go to Sharon Cohen-Powers who makes sure all the information is available on the website about participating in the PSA Youth Showcase. She spends a great deal of time making sure the information, directions, entry forms, and model release forms are posted in autumn. Then she makes sure the director receives copies of the entry forms for the projected images as they arrive. She posts the showcase winners on the PSA website after they are presented at the conference.

Each student with an acceptance or an award-winning image receives a certificate and a copy of the brochure featuring the winning images and a complete list of awardees and those with acceptances in both sections, prints and projected images. The awardees also receive a ribbon and their prize award gift card along with a student membership in PSA. The people who make this part of the program proceed so smoothly are the PSA Headquarters staff. They pull everything





Tehachapi Loop Illuminated by Train Light

Tehachapi Loop

I think the inner child in each of us is fascinated by trains. What could be more exciting than a train that crosses over itself while going in a circle or parts of the train traveling in opposite directions! Welcome to the Tehachapi Loop where all these things can happen. The Tehachapi Loop is located in the Tehachapi mountains as they rise from the central valley of California to the high point in Tehachapi. The loop is west of Tehachapi, California, just off

Highway 58. The loop is marked by a historical marker at the Keene exit from highway 58 and is three miles up the Woodford-Tehachapi Road. There is a pull-off area and a viewing platform at this location.

The loop was built to keep the track grade at a reasonable rate as trains climb from the Central Valley, near Bakersfield, to Tehachapi on the way to the Mojave Desert. The loop accomplished this
